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## Zgodba treh bork: Mete, Ivanke in Nade.

### Spor pri preimenovanju šole v Grižah leta 1969

#### IZVLEČEK

Poleti 1969 je v okviru rubrike Irene Špenko v časopisu Pavliha izšla pesem »Od Griž pa do Žalca« brez podpisa. Za pesmijo je stala pesnica Meta Rainer, 65-letna upokojena učiteljica, ki se je na sodišču zaradi petkitične pesmi soočila z Zvezo združenj borcev NOB Občine Žalec in sodni boj tudi dobila. V prispevku gre za zgodbo o družbeno-kritični pesnici iz socialističnega obdobja in preimenovanju vzgojno-izobraževalnih zavodov po vojnih herojih ter odstranitvah njihovih imen oziroma za zgodbo o boju med taboroma dveh padlih partizank – Nade Cilensek na eni strani in Ivanke Uranjek na drugi.

#### ABSTRACT

#### THE STORY OF THREE FEMALE FIGHTERS: META, IVANKA AND NADA. CONFLICT REGARDING RENAMING OF A SCHOOL IN GRIŽE IN 1969

In the summer 1969, the Slovene satiric newspaper Pavliha published an anonymous poem »Od Griž pa do Žalca«. Author of the poem was poet Meta Rainer, a 65-year old retired teacher who, because of the poem, fought a legal battle with the Union of the Associations of Fighters of the National Liberation Movement of Slovenia of the Community Žalec and won. This paper presents a story of sociocritical poet of the socialist era and renaming of educational establishments after war heroes and removal of their names – i.e., the story of a battle waging between the camps of two fallen female partisans Nada Cilensek on one side and Ivanka Uranjek on the other.

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## SUMMARY

### The story of three female fighters: Meta, Ivanka and Nada. Conflict regarding renaming of a school in Griže in 1969

In the summer 1969, the Slovene satiric newspaper *Pavliha* published a five stanza poem »Od Griž pa do Žalca« about a renaming of newly built school by poet Meta Rainer, who ended up facing Union of the Associations of Fighters of the National Liberation Movement of Slovenia of the Community Žalec (ZZB NOB) in the court of law. The poet was sued for defamation and stating untruth regarding renaming of a school. Poet attempted to show in her poem a battle waging between the camps of Ivanka Uranjek and Nada Cilenšek, each trying to get the school named after the respective fallen female partizan.

Original school in Griže was built in 1838, so that by 1969 it no longer met the needs of school faculty or pupils. On 31<sup>st</sup> August 1969, new school building was opened. It had 13 classrooms, teachers' studies, library, kitchen and gym, as well as central heating. The new school was named after partisan Nada Cilenšek.

Nada Cilenšek was born in 1925 in Migojnice. At the outbreak of the war, Nada was a student at Grammar School in Celje, but in July she and her family joined the partisan movement together with her father Rudi, mother Julka and 11-year-old sister Laura. Nada's parents Rudi (president of the ZZB NOB in Žalec when the new school building was built) and Julka were active members of the second World War resistant movement around Celje and in socialist Yugoslavia, but Nada died in 1944. Ivanka Uranjek, born in Griže in 1921, was a teacher at the school in Griže for a while, but died at the start of the war in Yugoslavia in 1941 as the first Slovene female hostage.

In 1970, the district court in Celje delivered a verdict that a private lawsuit against Meta Rainer is to be stopped. The court stated, that based on evidence presented, it is clear that the school in Griže was previously named after Ivanka Uranjek and that there actually was opposition between two groups regarding renaming of the school. Therefore, the poet did not insult anyone by mentioning the confrontation in the poem, but was rather trying to show the situation in a jocular way.
